### YOUTH MERIT PROGRAM INSTRUCTIONS

- Clover Bud has 1 level, Junior and Intermediate have 3 levels, Senior has 4 levels
- This is designed for the member to advance through 1 level each year
- The most levels they can complete in 1 year is 2 levels
- Member must work on correct levels for their age division
- At the completion of each level the member is presented with a medal
- Medals will be given to the club leader for presentation at the club meeting. Medal
- recipients will also be acknowledged at the county awards banquet.
- The leader may assign other resource leaders, within the club, to coordinate
- checking off tasks. Several leaders is suggested.
- Member participating cannot be checked off by a family member
- "Demonstrate" tasks must be witnessed by such leader not informed of completion
- elsewhere.
- "Define, explain, or describe" tasks must be told to or handed to the leader in
- charge of the program for your club.
- It is the members job to arrange times to present a task to the leader in charge to get tasks checked off.
- Member does not need to have a horse to complete this program, they can borrow a horse where needed.
  - Be reasonable when setting goals. They should be appropriate for the members
- age and riding level. Goals should be initialed when the member has set the goal and again when the goal is achieved.
- Goals set must be related to members equine project
- Every task must be checked off on a level before the level is completed
- Completed form must be presented to receive medal.
- Leader will be provided with answers for questions that have a definite explanation.
- On identification tasks, list the parts on the form for future reference.
- Keep in a safe place, lost advancements sheets will require tasks in current level, or completed levels not yet awarded, to be redone.
- Clover bud's cannot receive coaching from someone while completing tasks.
- Mentors are expected to work with their "buddy" for at least the current 4-H year.
- Keep this packet stapled or in a binder.
  - All leaders that check off this member should sign the back page to identify
- themselves.
- Those members that falsely represent themselves as completing tasks will
- immediately forfeit any future participation in the Youth Merit Program
- The point of this advancement program is for the members to learn new things that will make them a better horseman, 4-H'er and member.
